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Notes arising out qf Mr. W. D. Hincks's review of Mr. Donisthorpe's 'A List of the Type-Species of the Genera and Sabgenera of the Formicidae.'—Mr. W. D. Hincks, in a favourable and complimentary review of my paper (antea, cover, p. vii), calls attention to a few slips and some other points which require correction. Of these it is necessary to deal with the following:—

Ponera Latreille (p. 685). This requires a little explanation. Latreille described Formica coarctata in 1801; in 1802 he described the same insect under the name of Formica contracta. In 1804 he founded the genus Ponera, and in 1805 he cited his contracta as type.

Cryptocerus Latreille, 1804 (p. 635) is a synonym of Cephalotes Latreille, 1802, and therefore sinks. The type for each is Formica atrata Linnaeus, monobasic in both.

Mr. Hincks points out that *Decamera* Roger, 1863 (p. 637), is preoccupied by *Decamera* Mulsant, 1842. This has been overlooked by Dalla Torre, Forel, Emery, Wheeler, myself and all other myrmecologists. I propose the name **Hincksidris** nom. nov. for *Decamera* Roger, 1863, nec *Decamera* Mulsant, 1842.

The same may be said for *Diabolus* Karawajew, 1926 (p. 638). Karawajew established this subgenus on what he erroneously supposed to be an undescribed species, which he called *Dolichoderus* (*Diabolus*) bifurcatus. Unfortunately this was the same as *Dolichoderus* (*Hypoclinea*) cuspidatus surbecki Santschi, 1925. Wheeler in 1935 adopted Karawajew's subgenus *Diabolus* with type *Polyrhachis cuspidatus* F. Smith (1857). Mr. Hincks, however, shows that *Diabolus* Karawajew (and of course Wheeler) is preoccupied by *Diabolus* Gray, 1841. I propose the name **Karawajewella** nom. nov. for *Diabolus* Karawajew, 1926, and Wheeler, 1936, nec Gray, 1841.

I should like to add two corrections of my own:—Nothomyrmecia Clark, 1934 (p. 675): the tribe is given correctly as Myrmeciini, but the subfamily, by a slip, as Myrmecinae instead of Ponerinae. Everyone knows the 'Bulldog' ants are Ponerine. Spelaeomyrmex Wheeler, 1922 (p. 727): the tribe is inadvertently given as Solenopsidini instead of Pheidologetini.—HORACE DONISTHORPE, British Museum (Nat. Hist.), London, S.W.7: March 3rd, 1944.
